Chief Executive's Report by Pauline Leeson

Firstly may I apologise for the absence of the Spring/Summer newsletter – and hope that the double edition will go some way towards making up for this. I am temporarily back at the helm writing the newsletters, so I must hold my hand up and admit that this is entirely my fault – and hope I am forgiven!

During the past year Holly Hedge has rehomed 322 dogs and 268 cats, which shows an increase in dogs rehomed, and a slight decrease in cats. This year kitten season started in February, and has been ongoing ever since. We have had as many as 68 kittens and 33 adults to care for at one time, and have had to appeal for foster homes to help an insurmountable situation as we cannot contemplate leaving pregnant or nursing mums or kittens to fend for themselves or become feral.

Faith, Hope & Charity

It's been a turbulent year, with a rollercoaster of ups and downs, and many things sent to try us, but we feel at last, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. This is largely thanks to **Ethicall** who have paved the way for Holly Hedge to generate more income with our charity shop, and giving us the opportunity to sell our own brand of merchandise and pet products in a much bigger reception area. The shop is thriving and boosting our coffers considerably. With our new Manager, Claire and a great team of volunteers the shop is going from strength to strength. I must give a special mention to Zelah who dresses our shop window every week, making it look so spectacular and inviting. Everyone is doing a brilliant job. We are also doing well with sales in reception, and our future is certainly looking brighter. This year Ethicall have kindly allowed us a grant for a Fundraiser for a year, also a new, userfriendly, more professional, updated website that will promote Holly Hedge in a new and progressive way, including an on-line shop. This has meant so much to the Charity, and given us a solid foundation for the future of Holly Hedge and all the animals who depend on us for their wellbeing. Their faith in us has been so uplifting and inspirational, and we will

never be able to thank them enough for believing in us.

Staff and **volunteers** have been brilliant, and have pulled together to establish a team to be proud of.

Holly Hedge is so fortunate to have such loyal supporters who strive to see the Sanctuary flourish, and continue to be a crucial lifeline for the increasing number of animals needing our help.

There are many, many people that we have to thank for making Holly Hedge the special place it is today, people who have stuck with us through changing and challenging times, and although it is impossible to give everyone a mention, these wonderful people have our immense gratitude. Apologies in advance to anyone I may have forgotten on our 'thank you' pages, you will undoubtedly be mentioned in the next newsletter.

Our fabulous Fundraisers continue to do us proud, with **Dianne Stephens** organising shop collections and table top sales. We really appreciate all their unwaivering support and dedication.

Star support

We have been extremely fortunate to be involved with the Vodafone World of Difference who do such sterling work to help charities. Sam Chapman, one of our volunteers applied for a grant to work as a Fundraiser for Holly Hedge for 2 months and was accepted. With Christmas fast approaching we are already experiencing an influx of unwanted pets, both dogs and cats. Today we took in a heavily pregnant cat, and a mum with her 6 puppies, who will definitely not be rehomed as Christmas presents.

Mastiffs make wenderful Cempaniens

I had made several visits to Holly Hedge, looking for a dog who would be the right temperament to join my two dogs, both rescue and both with 'issues' before I adopted them; one a female alsatian and the other a male lurcher 'cross' who does get 'cross' with other dogs. I was giving up hope of finding a suitable companion who would also have to live with cats, koi carp fish, a tortoise, ducks and two cockatiels, when along came 'Meg'. Holly Hedge had rescued her from a life of living in a garage, being used as a breeding machine. Her undercarriage left a lot to be desired, but having suckled so many puppies, what is a girl to expect!! It was love at first sight and after meeting my dogs, and the home check was complete, it was clear she was the perfect dog to join our pack. She is gentle, calm and very tolerant, often sleeping with two cats wrapped around her head! Week by week she has adapted to enjoying walks across the fields, even 'plodding' after rabbits who always escape miles ahead of all three dogs. She has got used to getting into the car and even watching TV – especially the animal adverts!

Some months later I sadly lost my alsatian and fate stood in when I received a call from Holly Hedge advising me that a female mastiff urgently needed a home.

The owner didn't want her going into kennels, but needed to re-home her as she was being left at home for up to 10 hours a day while he was at work. So after a phone call to the owner, arrangements were made for Suki to visit before the weekend.

Not a classic beauty like Megan who has a proper bull mastiff face and brown colouring. Suki is black brindle, has a pushed back nose, a protruding tooth and looks a lot like a little gorilla, a fat little gorilla, as she needs to lose weight. But the dogs took to her straight away and Jason, my lurcher, can be very fussy about newcomers! The cats also took to her and she to them, sleeping with one of them on her first night with us. She is just like Megan in her quest for attention and cuddles, and also in her quest for food, as I discovered to my cost when I left an apple pie on the side of the kitchen and it disappeared leaving only a few tell-tale crumbs round a little black mouth which looked very satisfied with itself! My other two dogs looked completely disgusted and assured me that they had nothing to do with the theft or with eating the evidence! I would like to say that I can now safely leave things out again as she seems to have got over her tea-leafing.

Another thing which surprised me was Suki's turn of speed. Usually she ambles around with Jason and Meg, but if Jason takes off after a scent or if, as sometimes happens, we take a friend's dog out with us, a Belgian shepherd who runs even faster than Jason, she can change gears and run across fields as fast as they can, leaving Megan and me to amble along in their wake.

Suki has fitted into our home beautifully and everyone who meets her falls in love with her, as we did. Her main happiness comes with giving and receiving lots of cuddles and she and Megan vie with each other as to who gets the

most attention, while Jason watches over them with the air of a dog who knows his own worth and doesn't need constant petting to prove it! I think they are perfect.

We knew she wasn't out of the woods yet - what she really needed was her mum, so we tried the next best thing and placed her with Simba, a very maternal and friendly cat and her five, almost three week old babies. Simba took over straight away, and washed her, mothered her, and tried to feed her, but May was still too weak to suckle at first, so Lou who was caring for her, had to squeeze some of Simba's milk slowly into her mouth until finally little May found the strength to latch on - then there was no stopping her!

Later on that evening Mum and kittens were all snuggled up together and little May was as warm as toast with a very full tummy. The following morning this little fighter was so much better, she had gained strength and could find her way to Simba's teat, totally accepted by her step siblings. Aren't animals wonderful, they could surely teach we humans a thing or two!

In spite of searching for her birth mother, she was never found – we can only hope someone is caring for her too. Ten days lapsed and May opened her eyes. It didn't bother her at all that she was so much smaller than her brothers and sisters, and she loved to watch them play even though she wasn't big enough to join in. She was a happy, plump, healthy little kitten, and adored by everyone.

The time came when she was old enough to find a human family who would love and care for her as Simba had done. She didn't have to wait too long to find her forever home, and is thriving on all the attention lavished upon her.

Liffle Lucy

Lucy was only 8 months old and was diagnosed with a Liver Shunt. She came to Holly Hedge with her siblings who were all fit and healthy and much bigger than her. This is a congenital defect in which an abnormal blood vessel shents blood from the intestines, bypasses the liver, and goes straight into the rest of the circulation system. As some blood has not been dealt with by the liver it means some substances from digestion are not broken down and can cause neurological signs, especially just after eating, such as odd behaviour, salivating and the occasional gastrointestinal upset. On vets advice by managing the diet, and keeping protein levels reduced we helped control these signs and Lucy maintained a good quality of life, behaving like any normal kitten of her age. She loved to play with the other kittens, and romps around with Alice, a little Staffie puppy in the large cat garden, running up and down the climbing frames and chasing leaves.

There is an operation which may cure Lucy, but there are no guarantees that the shunt wouldn't reoccur, and the whole procedure could cost £5000 with no guarantees. This still isn't ruled out, but as she was thriving on

diet alone with only the 'odd blip' we thought 'leave well enough alone'. Our vet said she could go on for another 5 years at least.

As much as we all loved little Lucy, and she was a great favourite with our cat cuddlers, she needed to be in a loving home - but who would want this little mite. She had a great deal of interest in her, but as soon as her medical condition was explained other cats or kittens were chosen instead.

Then Maggi and Gihan came along, and their hearts went out to her. There was no hesitation, Lucy was the one for them. At last she was going home and everyone at Holly Hedge was overjoyed. We can't thank them enough for giving Lucy the happiness she deserves.

Light! I was born at Holly Hedge in August 2010, where I was brought up by everyone to be friendly and fearless. Grrrr! I got to stay at HH for a long time because my liver doesn't always work as it should. Super friendly visitors came to see me and were sorry they couldn't take me home because they needed extra time to look after me. I liked being at HH lots, though. Everyone made a humongous big fuss over me and I made fast friends with lots of great dogs and cats and humans, too. I'll always remember HH and how much fun I had there. Then Maggi and Gihan came along — they had that bit of extra time, so they got to take me home (lucky folks!). Since then, we've had loads of adventures together. I get to climb stairs, ladders, trees, and fences aevery day and see my fetching reflection in the pond in our garden. I get to chase crinkly leaves and sniff out all the stories in the wind. Gihan climbs trees with me. Because of my slightly wonky liver, I can't go outside by myself, but Maggi gave me a pretty pink harness with cherry blossoms on it, and I take her for walkies all over - the tennis court, village hall, playing fields lined with copper beeches and oaks (crinkly leaves!!!), into Yarnole Wood and up Ashton Hill, where you can see the Mendips stretched out like a great round mum of a cat all belly up and smooth warm green under the sun. Sometimes I like to sit very still and look straight up at the bright open sky between my whiskers. Prrrr! Maggi says it makes my copper eyes go all sparkley. I've made loads of new friends, too: tennis players and their dogs, football players, workers in hard hats having a laugh with me while digging ditches or trimming trees, neighbourhood children, grown-ups, Kizzy the Glamour Puss and Bailey the Irish Cream Spaniel - lots of walkers, too. Now that winter's coming, I'm looking forward to playing in the snow wheeeeeee! Happy Christmas Everyone!

So, you're ready to welcome a new member into your family. Having done your research, or so you think, and decided that what you want is

to have a dog. It would be lovely to have one to grow up with your children, greet you when you get home from work, company for when you are at home/and/or, a great way for you to get exercise. You know that when you do get one you don't want it to be able to harm itself or to ruin your home by chewing furniture/carpets etc, or end up possibly chewing live electric wires! So you talk to lots of people, some of whom suggest that it would be a good idea to put your new addition into a crate/cage when you are out -

recommended one, it can become a safe haven, a place to get away to when he/she want peace & quiet, and it is even supposed to help with 'house training' as animals 'won't toilet in their bed'. You decide that must be the way to go so, along with bowls, leads, and blankets, purchase a cage for your new pet. When leaving the house you pop him/her into the cage with some water and a couple of toys. On arriving home again the poor thing is soooooo pleased to see you and when let out of the cage, runs around like a whirlwind, jumping up and grabbing anything he/she comes across and starts chewing it, urinating on the floor in excitement - basically doing anything possible to get your undivided attention. You need to clean all the mess up and get your pet to calm down, so he/she is back in the cage again!

I have just taken on a 14 month Labradoodle (although she looks more like a lurcher and is the same size), who has been crated all day 3 days a week due to her previous owners working commitments. She is a lovely girl - BUT - she has no social skills at all. She has never had to learn self discipline so jumps up at everyone (and she is a big girl to be doing that), she wants to play ALL the time, she just doesn't know what to do with her freedom. She wants to play with the younger of my two other dogs, and so does he, but she doesn't know when to stop, and so when he wants to, she becomes a bit of a bully. I think she must also have been shut away when people are eating as she would have her nose on your plate if she could get away with it!!! Our next step with her is to take her to training classes as soon as we can get her into one, but it is going to be so much harder for her because she has 'learnt' so many bad habits. When we are out on our 'off lead' walks she is in heaven. She runs like the wind with our younger dog (see action shot of her having fun) and is now gaining the confidence to go further from us (possibly a bit too much so!!!!) and it is a joy to see her enjoying herself so much.

She has no muscle tone from where she has been cooped up in a very confined space and, although she was about 4-5KG underweight when she came to us, I think she is struggling to gain that weight purely because she has so much energy. Just think what it must have been like for her to have been confined for so many hours.

you do that to one of your children? No? Then please don't do it to your dog (who is also supposed to be a much loved member of your family). They need to 'learn' how to behave, just like children, and they cannot do that inside a confined cage. YOU have to teach them, exercise them, entertain them and if they need a 'safe haven', I am sure they will find one somewhere within their home.


Miñi Fuñdraisers

Holly Hedge have 66 kittens and 29 adult cats looking for caring, responsible owners.



This year has been one of the worst so far, with stray pregnant cats being brought to Holly Hedge from early March. Some have come in very underweight and needing veterinary treatment, but at least their babies have been born where their mums have all the TLC they need to bring up their kittens in a safe and caring environment. One thing's for sure, all mums will be spayed before they go to their new homes to prevent more unwanted kittens.

Today we took in another stray cat who turned up heavily pregnant in someone's garden and had 4 kittens 6 weeks ago. She is now pregnant again, but is in a clean, cosy cattery with food readily available, and need no longer fear for the safety of her offspring or where her next meal is coming from. We have received so many calls from public reporting stray

mums and kittens, some crying at people's doors desperate for food.

We never turn away pregnant or nursing mums as they are so

vulnerable. This year we have had to ask for foster homes to accommodate these poor little mites until Holly Hedge has had the space to take them in. If they are left to fend for themselves, they are at risk of being killed by predators (including the human variety)! Also this is how feral colonies come about, and so the vicious circle

continues. Kittens who are not old enough to be weaned have been found dumped and half dead, some too far gone

to be saved. Recently an emaciated little cat was brought in covered in maggots, and was nuzzling staff and purring, so pleased to be in safe hands. She was taken straight to our vet who could do nothing for her as the maggots had eaten in to her internal organs – she was put to sleep, and it was heartbreaking.



Only a few weeks ago we had a little dog brought into us, also emaciated and crawling with maggots. Luckily he survived and is now thriving in his new home.

Most of our 'tails' have happy endings, but there are those that are sometimes beyond help, and that is hard to come to terms with.

But right now we are looking for loving homes for 95 cats and kittens, and 35 dogs and puppies, and have a waiting list of over 100 animals needing help.

Foster homes are also desperately needed for dogs and cats, who are finding it stressful being in a kennel/cattery situation, especially if they are elderly.

HERO DOG

This story has a really lovely happy ending thanks to lan, Alex and of course Fizz, aka Rocky when he was at Holly Hedge Animal Sanctuary.

Fizz was brought to Holly Hedge on the day he was due to be put down after his seven days were up at a council run dog pound.

Not only is this a beautiful story, but is an accolade for Staffies who are one of the most maligned and unwanted dogs, and all rescues are full of them. It just goes to show how wonderful Staffies are in the right hands, and is testament to their loving and loyal nature.

I sincerely hope that this brilliant article brings a ray of hope to the hundreds of Staffies patiently awaiting caring homes in animal shelters everywhere.

I thought you'd be interested in an amazing tale about our Staffy Cross, Fizz (formerly Rocky), adopted from you in late December 2010. It might be of use to you as timely PR / media fare: ie. exemplifying the wonderful character of some of your rescued animals and not least the oftmisjudged Staffy Crosses you routinely receive at the shelter! Since we adopted Fizz, he's been walked daily and most regularly at the Ashton Court Estate. His boundless energy and enthusiasm has enthralled us; equally, he's grown extremely close to Tila my partner Alexandra's (Alex) gorgeous little Chihuahua cross such that they're now an inseparable pair who get up to all manner of mischief. Fizz has a wonderful disposition, much as was recognised by your staff whilst in your care as Rocky.

His amazing character was proven beyond doubt yesterday...

On 14 January, a walker lost a pair of female Shih Tzu's, Honey and Poppette, as they roamed on the estate. Subsequently, efforts were made through DogLost.com (and indeed to your sactuary) to publicise their loss and leaflets/ posters were placed widely around Ashton Court to focus search effort amongst other dog owners visiting there. We also became aware of their plight on a walk with Fizz and Tila the following day.

Then, on 17 January — as we walked our pair alongside woodland in the northern boundary of the Deer Park — Fizz spotted something. He bolted off, upon which we saw a small, fawn-coloured and rather bedraggled-looking dog quickly appear from undergrowth, only to then vanish quickly back into brambles and woodland. Alex and I were in no doubt that we'd just seen Honey one of the missing Shih Tzu's. With Fizz and Tila's help, we scoured the area for some

2 hours, having called the owner to attend and assist...

But to no avail. There was no trace of the cryptic missing pooch! We were very frustrated. Days passed. Every morning, for at least an hour, Alex and I returned with Fizz and Tila to search diligently for Honey. Her companion, Poppette, was fortuitously found elsewhere in the Estate and safely returned home... but Honey was nowhere to be seen.

Innumerable messages passed toand-fro between those searching for her

We were very worried for her welfare. As cold, wet days came and went - coupled to some much colder nights (-5C on some occasions) - we would return to the comfort of home and wonder about her, lost out in the elements, alone and facing the foxes, badgers and other perils we'd seen on our walks. In honesty, we progressively feared the worst for her, but never gave up hope. Fizz and Tila continued as 'dog detectives' every day, scouring the woods, brambles and un-trodden undergrowth with considerable effort and gusto. Every chased squirrel was a false alarm; every crackle we heard on the carpet of fallen leaves offered a short-lived moment of hope...but nothing more substantive.

Then, yesterday, 27 January, we walked again.

Exactly 10 days and nights had passed since we'd glimpsed Honey - ours had been the only sighting reported since she'd vanished. Undeterred, we walked again around the north of the park and this time, Fizz's behaviour was distinctly different. He was purposeful; driven; clearly on a mission. We knew something was up.

Our walk was nearing it's end. As we emerged from woods, aiming to head back to our car, Fizz



refused to follow. He seemed insistent on heading off another way, so we followed. Moments later - in an area bordered by dense undergrowth and ponds - he started charging to-and-fro in a frantic, highly-energised manner we'd never witnessed before. Then, suddenly, he raced into the brambles... And we followed.

As Alex caught up with him, there - crouched entangled in thorns; utterly bedraggled, thin; her eyes firmly closed and temporarily blinded by ulcers - was Honey. She growled; then went still. She was found - and she knew it. Her demeanour swiftly changed; she willingly accepted Alex's warm jacket interior to be cradled as a carry-cot, and finally we had her safe. Fizz, meanwhile, was clearly very proud of himself!

Shortly after some frantic calls,

her owner met us and she was

whisked-away to the vet. She's now back home undergoing treatment for her eyes; spent last night asleep in front of a warm fire: finally safe and snug. She's a lucky dog: her condition, not least the blindness, would have quickly conspired to finish her as she had lost any ability to drink, eat or defend herself against predators and scavengers. There's no doubt that after close to two weeks missing and alone, she'd have not survived much longer. It's no exaggeration to say that this little dog owes her life to Fizz; how ironic that a rescued Staffy - himself once close to being euthanased prior to arriving into Holly Hedge's

She will do anything for food, and is forever sitting for people in the park looking up at them with her chocolate brown eyes in the hope of getting a treat!

As well as being a lovely cheeky character she is also a hero! On Tuesday, 10th August a dear little Jack Russell x was brought into reception by a concerned gentleman who had found him by the Pavillion car park on the A38.

The poor little mite was emaciated, dehydrated and covered in live maggots, and was in total shut down mode. Staff immediately showered him off to remove the maggots and wrapped him in a warm towel to dry him off before taking him to the vet. When the towel was unfolded there were loads more maggots, some still crawling out from the wounds in his side - it was awful. We took him straight to Vale Vets at Portishead, who confirmed that he was also anaemic, had a low temperature and was very poorly. We were worried the maggots might have eaten into his internal organs, as Richard Bragg the vet said if this was the case, they wouldn't be able to save him. We left him in capable hands to do everything they could for him. He stayed at the vets for 2 nights, then we got a call to say he was much brighter, eating well and was ready to be collected. We were all so pleased, and so grateful to Sean and Chris, the kind gentlemen who took the trouble to rescue him, regardless of him crawling in maggots. Had they not done so, Stanley would surely have died.

This "tail" had a very happy ending, as Chris was smitten with Stanley's sweet nature, in spite of the condition he was in and couldn't wait to adopt him.

Holly & Mistletee


Holly and Mistletoe were 2 of an unwanted litter, and came to us at 10 weeks old and quite timid.

practically spent the first 4 to 6 weeks here living on a chair under the kitchen table, growling and hissing at me. She then started to walk around the house at night and found the spare bed which she took a fancy to. Slowly I managed to get closer and closer to her — it took a long time, a lot of patience, love, and sure people have been cruel to her in the past, so gaining her

It's great to now be able to tell you Carrie is becoming more and more domesticated these days - in fact she does everything a domesticated cat would except she is still unsure about letting me pick her up. Only this week when I came home one day she was waiting for me on the stairs, as if to say 'where have you been'. I guess she has decided having food and drink on tap, freedom to go outside, a bed to lie on, toys to play with,

a lap to sit on, and lots of cuddles, isn't such a bad life after all and a preferred one to living outside and defending for herself. She still fears other people - but we are working on it.

Earlier this year in July I officially adopted Carrie. We had developed such a bond with each other I couldn't bear the thought of giving her back and life without her.

If you are a patient person, have time and lots of love to give, take a chance on a feral cat, the rewards are so high, and I believe the bond between you and that cat will be a very strong one.



Happy Dog Tails'

Shandy and George

As most people are aware, the credit crunch is having a devastating impact on charities. Holly Hedge Animal Sanctuary is no exception, and is struggling to cope with the increasing number of animals needing veterinary treatment.

Last year we took in two five month old puppies. They arrived on 22nd May 1 crammed in a very small crate, their tiny bodies covered in mange, and they felt 18 red hot to the touch. The male weighed in at 3.70kg and the female 5.17k. The little male has a 'cherry' eye and his back legs were bowed and rickety. His breathing was laboured, and Richard Bragg of Vale vets. diagnosed a guarded prognosis. Both were malnourished, and looked more like eight week old puppies, - two sorry little sights who had the misfortune of a very bad start in life. A kennel was no place for these poorly puppies as they were fighting over food and affection, and needed so much individual attention and nurturing. The male who was called Lucky (not really appropriate) so we renamed him George, needed a costly operation on his 'cherry' eye once he was nursed back to health as this caused him some discomfort. Foster homes were found for both these little mites, and they began to thrive - but medical treatment was ongoing. They still needed antibiotics, and weekly baths, and the vet diligently monitored their progress. The stench of mange became less pungent and their characters began to surface, but there was still a long way to go. Three weeks, and 3 days later Kush weighed in at 6.15kg and George at 5.7kg, which was a vast improvement. They were definitely on the mend with all the care lavished upon them by their foster carers - we were all so relieved.

We do everything in our power to give all our rescues the best possible chance of a happy and brighter future – that is the purpose of Holly Hedge and why we exist, and why it is so important we continue to provide a safe haven for so many animals in need of help.



Shandy had a very bad start in life and was very poorly when we first fostered her. We welcomed her into our family and she settled really well, it's like we have always had her. She


He had to have weekly baths to cure his mange, and eye drops daily, and he took it all in his stride.

George has come a long way from the frightened, poorly little scrap he used to be, has learnt to do all the mischievious things normal puppies do, like chewing the chair legs and running off with Ryans toys!! He now has a beautiful shiny coat, is full of beans, and has grown quite a lot. He follows my 6 year old son around everywhere, and likes nothing better than to cuddle up on the sofa with all of us. With lots of love, patience and medical treatment, George has a new lease of life.


