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MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER

The past year has seen marked improvements in the progress of HH - not least the completion of 25 kennels and 3 long stay rooms with the dogs' own comfy sofas and individual gardens. We have also created sensory gardens with lots of interesting things to amuse and enhance our rescues' well-being, including agility equipment and fun things to capture their interest. This is not to say there isn't still a fairly long snagging

list that has to be put right!! But all in all, the new builds have the thumbs-up from our canine rescues.

As soon as we are able to obtain quotes and raise enough money, our rescued felines will also have their accommodation upgraded to a higher specification. Thanks to the **Jean Sainsbury Animal Welfare Trust** granting Holly Hedge £5,000 we have been able to buy hygienic feline Cat Forts for all our catteries, replacing the existing very 'tatty' and well scratched wooden furniture.

Jobs for the boys and girls

We no longer employ a Head of Fundraising, but we do have an innovative and enthusiastic Community and Events Fundraiser who is very pro-active, and has already raised the profile of the Sanctuary, as well as raising much needed funds.

We also have a new Kennel and Cattery Manager, Sarah Schranz, who has already proved to be an integral part of HH, although she only joined us a year ago. Another new member of our team is Lucinda Pullen who has been with us for just 10 months, but has settled in well and is getting to grips with the chaotic life of a busy animal sanctuary. They have both been well and truly thrown in at the deep end at our busiest time – but seem to be thriving on it! Both are already a great asset to Holly Hedge.

Rosie Bescoby, an accredited APDT, APBC and CABC Trainer and Behaviourist has joined us on a part time basis, showing us lots of new techniques for training and enrichment in the kennel and cattery areas and the outdoor gardens. As a result we have rehomed several of our long stay dogs – some of which needed very special and patient owners. Huge thanks must also go to our staff and volunteers for all the time and effort they put into the rehabilitation and rehoming process. They have made such a difference to these animals' lives, and given them the chance of a much brighter future through their commitment and dedication.

Tina Constance has also been instrumental in using her T Touch techniques to enhance our rescues' stay with us and make a positive difference.

Twilight years

Many of our long term dogs along with their little "foibles", as well as most of our long term felines have been rehomed, including our golden oldies, semi-ferals, and FIV cats. They have all gone to amazing homes, thanks to all the extra time and patience staff and volunteers have given them. I must extend a special thankyou to all our lovely volunteer lock-up ladies and gents who spend their evenings giving our felines individual attention and lots of cuddles and quality time. We are so very grateful to all our adopters, but especially the kind people who take into their homes and their hearts those who are elderly or terminally ill - but still have a good quality of life; those who have lost their trust in human beings because of abuse and neglect; and those with medical or behavioural problems. These wonderful people restore our faith in human beings, and give us the strength to carry on - regardless of the odds against us finding every animal a forever home.

We are so lucky to have **staff** and **volunteers** whose dedication and love for our rescues know no bounds, who devote their lives

to making a difference for the greater good of the animals in our care. Politics don't matter, only the animals and I am personally so proud to know them. There are far too many to mention, but you all know who you are.

We have a dedicated, working team of **Trustees**, who also only have the animals' interests at heart, and through strategic planning are ensuring the Sanctuary remains a safe haven for the increasing numbers of animals needing help.

On a sadder note, **Janet Temperton** has sadly had to resign due to her husband's ill health, but we thank her wholeheartedly for her dedication to HH and her continued support.

Our plans for the future are:

- Revamp our cattery to a higher specification, (which has been rather a long time coming), and re-roof the cat garden half way across. This will give more shelter from the elements when our rescued felines are stretching their legs and exploring lots of interesting things to do.
- Kit out our operating theatre so minor ops can be performed in situ - far less stress to our rescues as no travelling is involved.
- Use the Meeting Room for more income generating talks and staff training.
- Source another Charity shop whereby we can sell small items of furniture, as we made the decision to close down the Clevedon shop due to not making enough profit.
- Employ a part time Corporate/Trust Fundraiser.

Urgently needed is the creation of a quiet office for our Accounts manager and Fund raiser, so they can carry out their valuable work in quieter surroundings. The staff room will be refurbished to accommodate volunteers as well, and the reception and back office areas will be designed so that we have a bigger area to sell merchandise. We are so grateful to **Steve Copper** for volunteering to project manage this scheme which is already well underway, and for managing to recruit volunteers, and obtain a lot of the materials free of charge – which is brilliant!

Right now, Holly Hedge is full to capacity, with a long waiting list of dogs and cats needing our help. Kitten season is in full swing and in the last few months we have taken in 52 cats and kittens from 4 multi- cat households, as well as numerous others brought into us. So we now have over 100 cats and kittens in our care to find loving homes for, many needing veterinary treatment and rehabilitation. And so it goes on, but that's the nature of the work we have pledged to accomplish relentlessly.

Holly Hedge has so much to be grateful for - wonderful volunteers and supporters, amazing staff, Trustees who put everything into making HH a better place for our rescues, and most of all the love and dedication that shines through. HH has so much positive energy surrounding everything we strive to do. No matter how much we are up against it, we will survive whatever life throws at us, because we can never let down the animals who depend on us, or the wonderful people who believe in us. It is why we are all here, and why we will still be here for as long as it takes - and that could be a very, very long time.

KENNEL AND CATTERY UPDATE

This will be my first article for the newsletter as your Kennel/Cattery Manager, having been here a year now! We have had a lot of positive changes over the last 12 months including the arrival of our Assistant Manager Lucinda, but with a new management team in place, we have both jumped in feet first and are continuously striving to improve our welfare and enrichment programmes. The general daily care of all of our animals and ensuring that Holly Hedge continues to provide the best possible care and support for them is what we are most passionate about, ensuring they are as happy as can be with us until they finally find their purrfect forever homes.

This year has been extremely busy in the kennels and cattery with 250 Cats and 198 Dogs rehomed. These numbers, we are so pleased to say, include many of our long termers - the longest being Midnight, our Alsation X, who was here for nearly four years! Knowing they could offer the right environment to a dog who might take a little while to settle, a wonderful couple visited our Sanctuary looking for one that was hard to rehome. But from day one, Midnight took to home life with them like a duck to water... straight on the couch and snoozing away like he's always been there!

Sam, our German Shepherd X, was here for almost 18 months. His intelligent nature meant he had excelled at training - even doing some positive reward based police work whilst he was with us. Today, his new owners do a wonderful job continuing his training, ensuring he is well socialised.

Prince, our Brindle Lurcher, was here for three years until he was adopted by a wonderful couple who spent months building a relationship with him and getting to know his quirks. He excels in his new home with some behaviour support from us and is now a different and fun-loving dog.

Ridgeback X Luna arrived at Holly Hedge as a puppy and struggled with home life when he was adopted early into his stay, then came back to us after a short period. Having never had a real

home, we worried that he might never be able to settle. However one of our volunteers with time to give spent months walking him and building a bond with his other dogs; perseverance and patience which ensured that Luna now has a permanent home to call his own.

Other success stories were our dearest Staffy Dexter, Great Dane Bronson, stunning X breed Alani, Staffy Oz, Husky X Nicu, Staffy Tyrus, Labradoodle Rocky and many more - all of whom had lived with us for many months, before finding their own forever homes and families.

We haven't just had success with our long term dogs; we have also seen a rise in our longest resident cats being rehomed. Our beautiful Batman, who was one of our FIV* cats, finally found a home. FIV cats live long and happy lives and we were sad to see him constantly overlooked because of people's fear of taking a cat with a 'condition'. He sat patiently in his pen watching the world go by, until finally that special person came to the rescue. He isn't the only FIV cat to be rehomed this year; Claude, Jenson and Allsorts also moved on to loving,

Other rehomed long-termers included some of our most shy residents, who struggled because they didn't come out to say hello to potential adopters and weren't overly keen on being handled. One such was Fox, a very sad looking boy who was constantly ignored, until one day someone took a chance and adopted him. They realised he might always choose to hide away, but they weren't put off by that. And how wrong were we all! He was curious, friendly and wanting a tickle before the day was out! Other success stories included Tommy, Snowie and Sadie, all of whom are now settled and content in their new homes.

It all just goes to show how important it is to not judge a cat or dog the first time you see and meet them in our Sanctuary environment; the trick is to be patient and take the time to get to know them. With a wonderful behaviour team supporting us post-adoption, we continue to

have success with animals that may sometimes have been previously overlooked.

Of course we still struggle to rehome some of our older dogs and have seen an increase in pairs of dogs coming in to the sanctuary - mainly due to their owners becoming unwell, or being unable to find pet friendly rental accommodation. And we have been extra busy this kitten season, with an influx of lovely mums and their variously aged kittens, mostly being found in sheds and gardens: current count 52!

Sadly the majority of these lovely friendly cats aren't being spayed or micro-chipped, so end up straying and getting pregnant. However we continually try to educate people about the need for neutering and will always strive to improve animal welfare in our community.

Whilst these dogs and cats are in our care, we work hard to ensure that our kennel and cattery environment is as homely and as enriching as possible. With the help of corporate volunteers, we have created some fantastic spaces this year. including two new sensory gardens, with plants that have calming properties, interactive games and feeders, sand pits and paddling pools. Training plans, activities and interactive games in their kennels, all help to make our residents' time here the best it can be... and we have added couches and armchairs or raised beds to those kennels with sufficient space, to make them more homely.

The highlight of the summer was the arrival of new cat furniture, thanks to a grant from the Jean Sainsbury Animal Welfare Trust. It has made a huge difference, being so much easier to keep clean and hygienic, and our cats love the multi hiding spaces and various levels to climb up and down. The furniture has made an amazing difference and we can't thank the Trust

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all of our hard working volunteers who help us every day with our four-footed friends. Their efforts free up valuable time for staff, allowing us to focus on improving the lives of our animals and ensuring they're as happy as they can be.

Edu-paw-cation:




TRIBUTE TO DAVE PULLEY

A Festival Tail

This year the huge three-day Volksfest festival was held in fields by Long Ashton, just down the road from Holly Hedge Animal Sanctuary. The area was filled with cars and campers, loads of stalls, thousands of festival-goers and lots of all-night partying.

As the festival had kindly offered to raise funds for us, their local charity, we were invited to take some of our residents down for a parade. Proudly wearing their 'adopt me' coats, we headed with some of our dogs down to the show. It was such a hot day that we didn't want to stop too long, but our mixture of Greyhounds, Lurchers, Staffies, Shih Tzus, a Westie and a Japanese Akita, all received plenty of attention, with our dogs on their best behaviour.

What no one bargained for was that we would arrive with ten dogs and leave with eleven! But our idea of maybe finding one of our dogs a home, turned into a rescue mission for a very sweet 18-month-old Springer Spaniel called Blaze.....

During the festival, a trader had spotted this little black dog tied to a post at a car boot stall, with a large cardboard sign saying....

FREE..To a good home.. springer x staffie, 18 months old, vaccinated, micro-chipped, neutered, black & white, boy

As the dog sat tethered to the post in the blazing hot sun, it became more and more distressed as it was talked over and stared at by passing punters. Eventually a fellow trader who had watched the event unfold, realised the horrors that could face this lovely dog if it fell into the wrong hands during a show attended by thousands of people. So he asked the dog's owners if

he could take it for a walk. Apparently this had happened a few times during the day, except this time the trader had no intention of returning the poor dog.

Instead he went around the show, desperately trying to find someone to help. He eventually came across the dog agility team, which was demonstrating at the show – and they took the dog into their care whilst they tried to establish who was giving it away and why. An agility team member spoke to the Event organisers, who suggested they ask at our Holly Hedge stand for help. And of course we jumped into action, taking this little dog into our care.

Back at the Sanctuary, we scanned his microchip in case he was stolen property and confirmed that his name was Blaze, before attempting without success, to contact his owners. Meantime, Holly Hedge volunteers searched the showground for clues... and the owners were eventually located!

Sarah, our Kennel Manager, then talked to them about why they were giving Blaze away and they explained that the dog – which was still a bouncy puppy, needing plenty of exercise – couldn't be regularly walked, as they weren't well enough to do it. Yet it hadn't occurred to them that tying their pet to a post, along with a cardboard sign offering to give him away, wasn't the best solution.

In fact the owners were oblivious to the very real danger they had exposed this sweet little dog to. What if the wrong sort of person – perhaps even a child – had just taken him away? At the very least, he might have ended up abandoned somewhere, or taken into a home which wasn't suitable for



his particular needs; at worst, he might have ended up as dog bait at one of the many illegally run dog fights.

The owners claimed they had contacted other animal rescue centres in the Somerset area, but had not been offered kennel space, so instead had decided on this way of rehoming Blaze. At which point, Sarah encouraged them to allow Holly Hedge to rehome their pet with more suitable owners and helped them to sign Blaze over to us officially by completing the necessary paperwork.

We bring you this story to highlight the dangers of trying to give a dog away for free. Anyone could have taken possession of Blaze with just a convenient lie or two about what a nice, caring, spaniel loving family he would be going to. And the poor creature could easily have ended up abandoned, savaged and attacked for sport, beaten or killed – with no one any the wiser.

Blaze could easily have met with an awful fate at the hands to total strangers but instead, he was rescued by Holly Hedge. And he was such a lovely, friendly little dog that it's no surprise to us that we found him a truly loving, happy home with responsible, caring owners, in no time at all....





WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A VOLUNTEER?

My name is Erin Millard and I am twelve. I volunteer at Holly Hedge most Sundays and in school holidays as my mum, Angela Millard, works at Holly Hedge.

WHAT DO I DO?

As a volunteer at Holly Hedge there are many jobs. What I do is volunteer in the cattery and the office doing jobs for and helping the staff. In the cattery the jobs to do are: clean out the cat pens, help feed the cats, cuddle cats, sweep and mop floors, clean and fill the litter trays and clean the store room. Back in the office I make cat toys, help with donations, sort out stamps and help the staff.

WHY DO I LIKE VOLUNTEERING?

I like volunteering as the staff are so lovely and kind and you don't have to do anything you don't want to do. Also I love cats and dogs, and I get to see those a lot. And I can help out with fundraising.



BEHAVIOURAL ISSUES AND RESCUE DOGS

Many dogs show unwanted behaviours, whether they have come from rescue backgrounds or not. The likelihood of an individual dog exhibiting behaviour issues is down to both 'nature' (genetics) and 'nurture' (life experiences).

Sometimes behaviour 'problems' are completely normal behaviour from a dog's perspective, but are unwanted from a human perspective. For example, digging is a natural behaviour for dogs, but the owner may not want the dog to dig in the garden. Other times, owners expect a dog to be able to do something that is not actually natural behaviour, for example being left alone in social isolation all day, which may give rise to unwanted behaviours.

However, at other times expression of a behaviour problem is a symptom of pain, illness or an emotional disorder. In other words, there will be an underlying motivation which causes the dog to act in a certain way. It may be a response to something that is present in the environment, or a learned behaviour to something that happened in the past. In this instance, the dog will automatically resort to a certain type of behaviour when presented with situations that trigger a 'memory' of the thing that previously induced a reaction.

Whenever any animal exhibits a behavioural problem, the first port of call is always the vet. Some illnesses will cause certain unwanted behaviour, whilst pain or illness will reduce a dog's ability to cope with life and stressful situations.

When a dog feels frightened of something, it has various behavioural options to try to increase distance from the scary thing. Dogs will typically try not to use aggression because, in the dog community, this would lead to a risk of injury. However, when other behavioural strategies appear to be ineffective, dogs will resort to aggression in an attempt to repel a threat. They then learn that aggression is a successful strategy and start to use it more frequently, instead of other behavioural options.

Socialising Your Puppy

If the parents of a puppy appear fearful or aggressive in any way, the puppies are likely to inherit genes that make them more likely to exhibit fearful behaviours (or they may have learnt these behaviours from their parents). This is why it is always so important to meet the parents of any puppy you are interested in purchasing!

Anything a puppy is not exposed to during approximately its first 14 weeks of life, is more likely to make the animal fearful when it does eventually encounter the issue or experience. This is known as the 'sensitive period for socialisation'. This means that it is important to socialise your puppy to a variety of dogs and humans during this time, and to expose it to anything non-social that it is likely to be exposed to during its lifetime. However, it is also really important that anything that the puppy does encounter during this sensitive period, it finds positive. It has become very common for new owners to attempt to 'socialise' their puppies by putting them into situations that a puppy is likely to find overwhelming and so won't be a positive experience for it (e.g. 'Puppy parties' which involve all the puppies having a free-for-all with unregulated rough-and-tumble play, or taking a puppy to the kid's school drop- off and being swarmed by excitable children). Socialisation that is too intense can be highly damaging and fearful responses can develop.

A single, intensely fear-inducing event can be enough for a dog to exhibit fear responses in similar situations long-term and the dog will likely begin to generalise its fear. For example, if a dog initially had a negative incident with a black Labrador on a walk, it first might start to show a fear response towards black Labradors. Then it might begin to exhibit fear of other breeds of black dogs when it notices them in the distance. Add to this another event – such as the dog experiencing a bouncy, exuberant black terrier – and it will then start to show fear of terriers and so on.

When fears have already developed, it's essential to avoid encountering the fear-inducing situation until you can deal with the problem using an appropriate behavioural programme, given to you by a reputable behaviourist. This is because the more often you allow the dog to be scared by something, the more scared the dog will become and the more ingrained the fear. Avoidance is definitely the best policy to prevent the problem from getting worse, although the fear won't disappear on its own and behavioural training will be necessary under the guidance of the behaviourist.



BEHAVIOURAL ISSUES AND RESCUE DOGS

Other behavioural problems can be a result of frustration – where a dog has a high expectation of getting something and it doesn't get it; or when a dog is motivated to perform a behaviour that it is physically or psychologically thwarted to perform. Teaching puppies to cope and respond appropriately to low levels of frustration and to exhibit self-control is vital – in fact, this naturally occurs during the weaning process when the dam starts to prevent free access to the milk-bar.

Sometimes, humans attempt to stop a dog exhibiting unwanted behaviour by telling them off or using other forms of punishment. Sadly, unqualified behaviourists also advocate the use of punishment-based methods. However, this simply causes the unwanted behaviour to be suppressed, without addressing the underlying emotions driving the behaviour. Where a dog is reacting due to fear, punishing it simply increases its perception of threat and causes it to associate the already scary thing with being told off – that scary thing must be REALLY scary!

Dominance-reduction rules are apparently based on the natural behaviour and dominance hierarchies of Grey Wolves. However, the studies on which these assumptions were based used captive wolf packs that displayed very unnatural behaviour. Wolves in the wild do not actually have constant disputes over dominance – they live in family groups and share duties relatively peacefully.

Additionally, dogs do not think that we are dogs, or that they are human, and so wouldn't try to 'dominate' us anyway. Amazingly, it's actually been known for around 30 years that dominance doesn't actually work in the way that some 'trainers' have led us to believe. What a dog needs rather than an 'alpha leader' or 'boss' is something called a 'secure attachment figure'. This is a figure that the dog feels safe with and has a good relationship with, built on mutual trust. This can be a person or another dog in the family, but the bond between the attachment figure and the dog provides an in-built feeling of safety.

Cause and Effect

When we look to change a dog's unwanted behaviour, it's far more effective and kinder to alter the underlying cause (for example, change a dog's negative emotional response to a positive one) because if there is no motivation for the behaviour, it should stop. Trying to stop the behaviour without addressing the motivation means punishing the dog to suppress the unwanted behaviour. This method, sometimes used by unqualified dog trainers and behaviourists, leads to further suffering and can trigger other possibly more serious problems, including health issues.

Every dog is an individual, so tailor-made advice from a reputable behaviourist is going to provide the most appropriate information. This will involve taking all known history of the dog and the problem, identifying the cause or motivation, addressing the way the dog is managed in everyday life and then applying an appropriate behaviour modification programme. The first stage is always to visit your vet to make sure that there are no physical causes for the behaviour; discomfort, pain and hormone imbalances resulting from illnesses or injury must be treated and ruled out, before embarking on a behaviour modification programme. After a veterinary check, ask your vet for a referral to a reputable behaviour counsellor.

Looking for a decent behaviourist can prove a real minefield, since lack of regulation in the industry means anyone can currently call themselves one without having to show qualifications. Any good, skilled behaviourist will not need to use any methods of punishment, or insist that you use outdated dominance reduction programmes when treating your dog. Don't choose a behaviourist who doesn't require a referral from your vet – the vet is responsible for the health and welfare of your dog and must be happy with your behaviourist's methods. In addition, depending on what the problem is with your dog, your behaviourist may need to work with your vet if medication is required.







This was the first fashion show event that Holly Hedge has ever done; maybe it'll be a regular thing? We'll have to wait and see on that one!


